

"Chinese Textiles: Symbols of Rank, Status & Artistic Merit"

Speaker: Judith Rutherford

During the Ming Dynasty (1368-1644), textiles were used not only to denote rank and status but also as currency and tribute items. By the Qing

Dynasty (1644-1911), regulations and edicts clearly defined the roles textiles took on for court and official uses. Judith Rutherford will examine the fascination of textiles during these times in their own right, as significant works of art, and an artistic endeavour as well as symbols of rank and status. Ms Rutherford will further discuss the attraction textile items held for western collectors in the early 20th century, who appreciated the skills of the artisans who produced them.

At the end of Ms Rutherford's talk she and noted collector Mr. Edwin Mok, will take us through a gallery tour of **Heavenly Splendour: The Edrina Collection of Ming and Qing Imperial Costumes**, a sub-exhibition of 'Timeless Legacy: The Mok Family Collections'. This particular exhibition is staged in Gallery III, the CUHK Art Museum's brand new extension.

*An optional 'dim sum' lunch afterwards at the Shatin Jockey Club, on a shared-cost basis, will be arranged for those are interested.

About our speaker: Judith Rutherford is a specialist in the field of Chinese textiles from the Ming and Qing dynasties. She is president of The Asian Arts Society of Australia (TAASA) and founded the Textile Study Group of TAASA in 1994. She is a Trustee of the Asian Institute of Asian Culture and Visual Arts in Australia. She curated the exhibition, Celestial Silks: Chinese Religious and Court Textiles, at the Art Gallery of New South Wales in 2004, and co-authored a catalogue by the same name. In 2008, she was a contributor to the exhibition catalogue, Elegance of the Qing Court: Reflections of a Dynasty Through its Art, at the Joslyn Art Museum in Omaha, Nebraska, USA.

Professor Chen has a passion for sharing the experience gained in his life-long quest for knowledge and we certainly believe that this scholar's lecture will enhance our appreciation of both the scientific and the human pursuit of beauty.

About our speaker: Professor Tien Chi Chen (陳天機) is a University Honorary Fellow and Professor Emeritus of Computer Science and Engineering at the Chinese University of Hong Kong. He currently teaches University General Education courses on "The Universe, Knowledge and life" and "Nature and culture." From 1980 to 1988, he served as the Head of United College, CUHK. In recognition of his service in this capacity, the university, in March 2008, honored him with an invitation to participate in the distinguished 'Heads of United College Lecture Series' and he delivered a very well-received address.

ONGOING EXHIBITIONS:

HEAVENLY HORSES: HORSES IN CHINESE ART

Date: 14 July 2008 - February 2009

Venue: Gallery II, Art Museum

Over the centuries the horse has been a favorite subject of Chinese artists and a rich cultural heritage of depictions of this animal now exists. In celebration of the 2008 Olympic and Paralympic equestrian events in Hong Kong, this exhibition presents horses as they appear in a wide array of art forms and dating from the Warring States and Han periods down to the later dynasties. The exhibits are on loan from local collectors or from the Art Museum's own collection.

TIMELESS LEGACY: THE MOK FAMILY COLLECTIONS

Date: 26 July – November, 2008

Venue: Galleries I & III, CUHK Art Museum

In the 19 century compradors, replacing the thirteen hongs of the early China trade, became the Chinese elite of Hong Kong. They, and the south-to-north traders, were the two dominant forces in the Chinese merchant class and the community leaders. Among the many compradors, the family of Mok Sze Yeung (1820-1879) from Xiangshan, Guangdong was one of the best known, not only for its wealth and influence, but also for maintaining its relationship as the comprador of Swire over several generations. Ever conscious of the responsibility that great wealth and power brings, the Mok family showed concern for the welfare of the community, especially in philanthropic work and education as well as establishing a distinguished tradition of collecting art and antiquities.

This exhibition presents the Mok family collections of three generations in two galleries. Featured in Gallery I paintings, calligraphy, objects for the scholar's studio, ceramics and jades, ancestral furniture and portraits. Gallery III holds the Edrina collection of Ming and Qing imperial costumes. For details of the Friends' gallery tour of and lecture on this exhibition, please see page 6 of this newsletter.

CAMBODIA & HO CHI MINH CITY - Up river from the Mekong Delta to Phnom Penh

Note: Due to changes in the relationship between the code-sharing airlines on this route, deadlines for airline deposits have been brought forward.

Early expressions of interest in this trip would be appreciated.

19 – 27 November, 2005 9 days / 8 nights

Experience the bustle of Ho Chi Minh city before we make our way to the Mekong Delta, rice basket of the nation, buzzing with a slow but constant energy, awash with vibrant colour, with nearly every hectare of these fertile silt deposits intensively farmed. We take to the water in a chartered boat for the trip up the Mekong to Phnom Penh and our brush with the darker side of Cambodian history, before moving on to Siem Reap and the wonder of Angkor Wat and the surrounding temples, the highlight of the Khmer civilization and architecture.

In the 8th C, the mighty kingdom of Angkor embraced both the Hindu & Mahayana Buddhist influences from India, building some of the most monumental stone temple structures on earth. While the greatest of these is Angkor Wat, hundreds of other temple sites provide an equally lasting testament to the artistic prowess and religious fervour of this fascinating civilization.

Saturday 19 Nov (HK - Ho Chi Minh)

HK/Ho Chi Minh CX 767 (9:00a.m. - 10:35 a.m.) .

Lunch in local restaurant. This afternoon, enjoy a tour of Saigon. Visit Notre Dame, the History Museum and a lacquerware factory. We will also explore Chinatown on a cyclo ride & have time for shopping in the Benh Tanh Market. Evening welcome dinner at Vietnam House, well known for its excellent Vietnamese cuisine. Overnight at Majestic Hotel.

Sunday 20 Nov (Ho Chi Minh)

Visit Cu Chi Tunnels (1 hour drive away) – an amazingly complex system of underground tunnels constructed by the Vietcong during the Vietnam war. After lunch in Tay Ninh, drive back to Saigon. Late afternoon shopping along Le Loi Street's art galleries & craft shops. This evening, enjoy a French dinner at L'etoile in a French colonial building. Overnight at Majestic Hotel.

Monday 21 Nov (Ho Chi Minh - Chau Doc)

Drive about 6 hrs from Saigon to Long Xuyen, right in the heart of the Mekong Delta. After lunch at local restaurant, we explore the labyrinth of rivers and tributaries – one moment it is quiet & peaceful deep in the rainforest and the next, bustling with life, boats and floating markets.

Check into Victoria Chau Doc - dinner at the hotel.

Tuesday 22 Nov (Chau Doc - Phnom Penh)

Today, we travel upriver towards the Cambodian border, enjoying more bustling scenes en route. Cross the border and continue journey to Phnom Penh(about 4 hours) On arrival, check into Micasa. Lunch at Friends, the restaurant. Afternoon visit to the Royal Palace and Silver Pagoda. We will also visit the shop of weaving master – Liv Sa am. Dinner at the Foreign Correspondents' Club followed by a traditional show at Sovanna Phum Theatre from 19:30 to 10:45p.m.

Wednesday 23 Nov - (Phnom Penh - Siem Reap)

This morning, we deal with a dark chapter of Cambodian history as we visit sites related to the Khmer regime. Visit the notorious Tuol Sleng Museum,then continue to the Killing Fields, with a memorial for the thousands who died during the regime – a moving sight. Lunch at Khmer Surin. In the afternoon, explore the Russian Market. Transfer to the airport for flight Phnom Penh/Siem Reap **FT 996 (5:50p.m.-6:35 p.m.)** Transfer to Grand Hotel D'angkor. Dinner at hotel.

Thursday 24 Nov (Siem Reap)

We start with the oldest group of temples – the Roulous Group. Preah Ko (880), Bakong (881) & Lolei temples (893). Then, we move on to Prasat Kravan (921), Srah Srang (about 967), Bantaey Kdei (about 12th century), Pre Rup (961) and Mebon Oriental (952).Lunch at Chez Sophea. Devote the whole afternoon to Angkor Wat itself, including detailed study of the bas reliefs of Hindu mythology & Khmer history. Enjoy sunset in a quiet temple. Dinner at Orientalist.

Friday 25 Nov (Siem Reap)

For the energetic, rise early for sunrise at Angkor Wat! Return to hotel for breakfast. This morning, we explore Angkor Thom, site of the ancient Khmer capital of the Khmer. Visit the South Gate (Late 12th century), Bayon (Late 12th to 13th cenutry), Royal Enclosure(Late 10th to early 11th century), Elephant Terrace (Late 12th century) & the Terrace of Leper King (13th century). Lunch at Dragon Soup in town. This afternoon, we drive about 45 min. to Tonle Sap Lake and enjoy a boat trip on the lake to see the unique and ancient way of life on the water with its floating village. Dinner at Madam Butterfly.

Saturday 26 Nov (Siem Reap)

Another stunning sunrise experience! Drive 1 hour to Bantaey Srei (967), considered by many to be the prettiest temple. En route back, visit Bantaey Samre(12th century). Return to hotel for breakfast. Late morning, you will have time to visit Artisan D'angkor & shop in the Central Market. Lunch at Green House. P.M. visit Preah Khan Temple (where much of Tomb Raiders was filmed) (Late 12th century). Then, on to Ta Prohm (Late 12th to 13 century), which many consider to be the most charming of all the temples. This evening, a special treat as the local folks perform a traditional shadow puppet show using coconut husks. Dinner in Grand Restaurant in hotel.

Sunday 27 Nov (Siem Reap - Ho Chi Minh - HK)

Have a leisurely morning. After lunch at hotel transfer to the airport for flight Siem Reap/Ho Chi Minh VN 826 1:20p.m. – 2: 20p.m. Ho Chi Minh /HK VN 762 5:15p.m.-8:55p.m.

SRI LANKA - Ancient monuments, Museums, Temples & Spice gardens

28 JAN – 6 Feb, 2006. (Chinese New Year) 10 days / 9 nights

Ceylon, Serendipity, call it what you may, this fertile island is home to diverse peoples resulting in a kaleidoscopic variety of cultures that reflect some of the influences which reached these shores over the centuries, including Arab, Portugese, Malay, Dutch and S. Indian. With more legends than it can comfortably accommodate; the remnants of an ancient civilization and food which is a culinary delight, it is an island well worth visiting.

Join us as we visit **Anuradhapura**, ancient city of the Sinhala kings, where Buddhism was first introduced to the island in the 3rd C BC. Explore the ruins of **Sigirya**, a 5th C fortress atop a rock outcrop. Wander among the ruins of the city of **Polonnaruwa**, with its 12th C stone sculptures, bas-reliefs & friezes, then see the caves at **Dambulla** reflecting the epic struggles of Buddha against evil; **Kandy**, last seat of the Sinhala kings, renowned for its Temple of the Tooth, then on to the **Hill Country** to hike or relax before returning to **Colombo** to see the National Museum.

Saturday, 28 Jan (HK – Colombo)

HK/Col UL 423 (via Bangkok) (6:25p.m. – 11:30 p.m.)

On arrival, transfer to hotel in Negombo, close to airport.

Sunday, 29 Jan (Negombo – Dambulla)

After early breakfast, leave for Dambulla, stopping en route at the Elephant Orphanage. Proceed to Dambulla Buddhist Cave Temples - a vast isolated rock mass with 5 caves in which King Valagambahu sheltered during his 14–year exile from Anuradhapura. On regaining the throne in the 1st C BC, he had the interiors carved into magnificent temples. Check in at Kandalama Hotel.

Monday, 30 Jan (Dambulla – Anuradhapura – Dambulla)

Drive to Anuradhapura (380 BC), stopping en route to see the Aukana Buddha. The city's greatest treasures are its hemispherical dagobas, constructed of small sun-dried bricks – it's most renowned relic, the sacred Bo-Tree. Lunch and dinner at local restaurants. Overnight at Kandalama Hotel.

Tuesday, 31 Jan (Dambulla – Sigiriya – Polonaruwa)

This morning we climb to Sigiriya Rock Fortress (5th C) - perhaps the most fantastic single wonder of the Island as it rises almost sheer to a height of 500ft. Lunch at local restaurant. This afternoon we visit Polonnaruwa, capital of Sri Lanka from 11th - 13th C. Lankatileke, Tivanka and Thuparama are the largest and most beautiful shrine ruins while Tivanka has the best example of frescoes of the Polonnaruwa period. Dinner and overnight at Kandalma hotel.

Wednesday, 1 Feb (Dambulla - Kandy)

Drive to Kandy, en route visiting Spice Gardens at Matale. After lunch, city tour of Kandy, the hill capital and visit to the Temple of the Sacred Tooth Relic. The city is an example of Buddhism's influence in Sri Lanka today and abounds with temples, shrines & monasteries. Evening cultural show featuring various Sri Lankan dance types. Dinner and overnight at Hotel Suisse.

Thursday 2 Feb (Kandy - Nuwara Eliya)

Drive to Nuwara Eliya, visiting a tea plantation and factory en route. Reputed to be one of the coldest places on the island, it is much like an English spring day, although the temperature drops at night. Lunch at Ranboda Falls restaurant. Afternoon at leisure. Dinner and overnight at St.Andrew's.

Friday 3 Feb (Horton Plains)

Early morning hiking in Horton Plains National Park. Its unique flora harbours 52 species of resident birds & 11 species of migrant birds, as well as deer, Bear monkey, Leopard, Wild boar & many other animal species. This is the only Park where visitors may walk on their own on the designated tracks. Packed lunch provided. Dinner and overnight at St.Andrew's Hotel.

Saturday 4 Feb (Nuwara Eliya - Colombo)

Drive to Colombo. Lunch at Barefoot restaurant. Afternoon free for shopping in town - visit the Mlesna exquisite tea boutique, cashew nut shop, Majestic City & Liberty Plaza. Dinner and overnight at Colombo Hilton.

Sunday 5 Feb (Colombo)

City tour of Colombo visit the NATIONAL MUSEUM. Drive through Fort, Pettah & the Cinnamon Gardens. See the Hindu Temple at Sea Street lined with goldsmith's shops, the Dutch Church at Wolfendaal dating back to 1749, the historic Davatagaha Mosque & Independence Hall. Lunch at local restaurant. Farewell dinner at The Gallery. Overnight at Colombo Hilton.

Monday 6 Feb (Colombo / HK)

Early drive Colombo to airport for flight Col /HK UL 422 (via Bangkok) (7:45a.m. - 5:00 p.m.)

25 Feb - 2 Mar, 2006. 6 days / 5 nights

Join us as we experience both the charm & chaos of Hanoi, before departing to central Vietnam to explore the remnants of the ancient Cham civilization at My Son in the company of Prof Cao Xuan Pho who will also escort us through the wonderful Cham Museum in Danang.

Hue and Hoi An, both World Heritage sites, offer insights into the more recent history of Vietnam. Hue, capital of Vietnam from 1802-1945 under the Nguyen Dynasty provides many regal remnants from this time. Hoi An, an old port with it's fusion architecture, is a charming place to wander around. Our walking tour will be guided by Mr. Tran Van Nhan, vice director of Hoi An culture and information centre. This morning we drive 1½ hrs to My Son, one of the most important Cham religious sites in the country, set amongst lovely hills. After lunch, we enjoy a guided walking tour of Hoi An. This evening, a farewell dinner at Brother's café. Overnight at Victoria Hoi An.

Thursday 2 Mar (Hoi An/ Hanoi/ HK/)

Morning at leisure in Hoi An. 
UZBEKISTAN - Central Asia - mid April, Easter

Driving Directions to CUHK:

Take Eastern tunnel and follow signs to Shatin. Drive through Tate's Cairn Tunnel, get in left lane and turn off at second road to the left. Follow signs to Shatin central. Continue along this road; again go left to Shatin central. Right away, get into right lane and turn right at traffic lights. This road leads to Taipo Road. Go straight until you see sign overhead indicating University. Exit left and at roundabout bear right. Go straight and take right at second university entrance (Main). At gate you will be issued parking ticket. First 30 minutes of parking free, thereafter \$10 per hour. Drive 200 yards past gate. Parking lot is on right, Art Museum is on left. Surrender card and pay at gate when leaving.

Public Transportation to CUHK

From TST take KCR East to the University KCR station (25 minutes from Kowloon). Turn right when leaving the station to reach University shuttle bus making regular runs to Art Museum. Alight at Sir Run Run Shaw Hall (second stop); walk straight to Institute of Chinese Studies building, where the Art Museum is located. To return, catch bus on lower side of the Art Museum.
